

ABOUT HARAMBEE



Harambee House is a cultural center for students, faculty, and staff of African descent at Wellesley College. In line with the name Harambee, a Swahili word meaning "pulling together," our mission is to work together to stimulate academic, personal, and communal growth among students of African descent. For many, Harambee House is a "home away from home." Our living room is a large, comfortable space for a great variety of activities—from watching movies with friends to enjoying lectures and programs. The library houses a collection of literary, historical, and contemporary works devoted to the African Diaspora. Our kitchen is perfect for students in the mood for a real home cooked meal. On the lower floor, the den, computer area, and study rooms provide spaces for study sessions, organization meetings, and a place to just hang out with friends. WHAT DOES THE ASSISTANT DEAN/ DIRECTOR OF HARAMBEE HOUSE DO?

The Assistant Dean/Director manages

College community. She advises all

purpose is to serve students of African
descent.

The Assistant Dean/Director works with faculty, class deans, and other staff members to assist in the development of all students of African descent at Wellesley College. The Assistant Dean/Director meets with staff from student Life, the Alumnae and Admissions Offices, the Dean of Students, Associate Deans of the College, and the President of the College.





WHY SHOULD I MEET WITH THE ASSISTANT DEAN/DIRECTOR?

The Assistant Dean/Director advises students on coursework, career goals, participation in student organizations, and campus initiatives. By knowing who you are and your interests, she can refer you for awards, committee membership, conference attendance, or employment. She provides recommendation letters for scholarships, employment, and graduate school.

She can help you through the intricacies of college administration and can direct you to the proper channels as the need arises. She can advocate for you if you have any type of difficulty with fellow students, professors, staff, Resident Life, the Academic review board, or General Judiciary.

The purpose of Ethos is to provide a safe space for students of African descent to support one another and effectively organize around issues that impact Black students. Recognizing the unique challenges facing students of African descent in higher education, our mission is to create a supportive environment where such students are empowered to reach their full potential at Wellesley College.





Wellesley African Students Association (WASA)

The Wellesley African Students Association exists to promote the exchange of knowledge about contemporary issues affecting Africans and Africans of the Diaspora. Our aim will be achieved through activities, such as monthly discussions, lectures, cultural celebrations, community service projects, journals, film festivals, concerts, and participation in conferences.

Section 4: Get Involved



MINORITY RECRUITMENT, HIRING, AND RETENTION COMMITTEE (MRHR)

MRHR works with the Provost's Office, the Office of the President, the Office of the Dean, and faculty to help the College create and maintain diverse faculty and staff. Students can be representatives on this committee.

The Mellon Mays Undergraduate Fellowship

The fundamental objective of the Mellon Mays Undergraduate Fellowship (MMUF) is to increase the number of minority students, and others with a demonstrated commitment to eradicating racial disparities, who will pursue PhDs in core fields in the arts and sciences. The Program aims to reduce over time the serious under-representation on the faculties of individuals from certain minority groups, as well as to address the attendant educational consequences of these disparities.

FELLOWSHIPS

The CE work together to assist students and alumnae with applying to undergraduate and graduate fellowships. Fellowships provide participants with support, mentoring, and often financial assistance for their academic, research, and professional development.

Schneider Board of Governors (SBOG)

The SBOG is a student-run and led organization that is responsible for planning and hosting large-scale events on-campus. A section of College Government, the Board strives to make the social life at Wellesley exciting and inclusive.

Wellesley Women in Business (WWIB)

WWIB aims to help women find career direction, network with alumni and peers, and achieve ambitious career goals. WWIB holds panels, lectures, workshops, and field trips to connect students with alumnae and leaders in business professions of their interest and expose them to business graduate programs early on.

GLOBAL MEDICAL BRIGADES

Medical Brigades at Wellesley is a chapter of Global Brigades, the world's largest student-led global health and sustainable development organization. Global Medical Brigades develops sustainable health initiatives and provides relief where there is limited access to healthcare.

Residential Life

The Office of Residential Life works to build strong communities within each residence hall. Their mission is to share and model a commitment to the education of students through our roles as administrators, teachers, and mentors.

College Government/Senate

The elected Cabinet and Senators of College Government work to administer and implement the various functions and responsibilities of CG by collaborating with student organizations, administrators, and staff, and holding events throughout the year. They serve as a liaison between the student body and the administration.

Societies

Societies are a long-standing tradition at Wellesley for making close friends and bonding over a passion. Each of the six societies- Tau Zeta Epsilon, Alpha Phi Sigma, Zeta Alpha, Agora, Shakespeare, and Alpha Kappa Chi - promotes fellowship and service through their respective purposes.

SEXUAL HEALTH EDUCATORS (SHEs)

The SHEs is a student organization that provides sexual health education, on- and off-campus resources, as well as support for Wellesley students through events such as SHEopardy in the residence halls, Sex Carnival, campus lectures, and Sex Positivity Week.

BALANCE HEALTH EDUCATORS (BHES)

The BHEs is a student organization whose goal is to promote health and wellness at Wellesley College. The BHEs emphasize the importance of living a balanced lifestyle through programming focusing mainly on sleep, nutrition, exercise, relaxation, and alcohol education.

ACTIVE MINDS/MENTAL HEALTH EDUCATORS (MHES)

Active Minds strives to create a safe environment for the discussion of mental health and advocate for the rights and needs of students with mental health issues. The MHEs are a subgroup of Active Minds and they are a group of specially-selected students in every residence hall that can direct students to services on- and off-campus.

<u>WZLY</u>

WZLY is Wellesley's student-run radio station. WZLY was the first all-women college radio station. There are currently sixty student Disc Jockeys and fifteen members on WZLY's executive board.

Intramural Sports

Intramurals are free of charge and all levels of skill and fitness are welcome. Our program currently offers leagues for volleyball, soccer, badminton, and basketball. We also offer many one-day events and tournaments, ranging from flag football to innertube water polo to kickball and dodgeball and much more!

EL TABLE

El Table doubles as one of Wellesley's working cooperatives and a dining facility. It is a student-run cafe located in the basement of Founders Hall that features vegetarian and gluten-free options.

Punch's Alley (The Pub)

Another working co-op, Punch's Alley is a student-managed and operated pub where you can meet with friends, dance away your stress, and occasionally jam out to live music.

CAFE HOOP




